Fritz came over and bombed
Paradise from 11 P.M. - 1 A.M. He
dropped 6 bombs in Campfield.

for the Ball Game. 22 miles. Rode
in motor ferry. About 14 Bays 10 officers
we were beaten by 14 Com Bays 8-3.
Arrived home again 9.40 P.M. Saw
A.C. Campbell Capt from here. Oh I
enjoyed the day. Thousands &
Thousands of Canadian Bays

Through June and into July, convoys filled our wards faster than they could be cleared. I was on night duty for a month in the medical ward, and it was crowded with sick men, suffering the effects of mustard gas. "Cough - cough - cough", I noted in my journal. "Oh, how those poor boys cough."
